CONTRAST	Ensure sufficient contrast between text and background. including text on images. Add a contrast checker to your browser. <u>Contrast</u>	too low good
COLOR	Use shapes, symbols, line decoration or pattern. Include alt text for icons. Avoid using color as the sole way to convey meaning. <u>Icons, Color Reliance and Contrast</u>	
IMAGES	Include Alt tags for all images and icons. Add full description and copyright info below image. Avoid using images solely for decoration. <u>Alternative Text for Images</u>	alt="description"
LINKS	Use descriptive link text andensure links are underlined. Include descriptive link text for image and icon links. Avoid "Click Here" links with no description. <u>Links and Hypertext</u>	Topic Information
TABLES	Use formatted headers for columns and/or rows. Avoid tables for non-tabular data or layout. Include a table caption or title. <u>Accessible Tables</u>	HeadingHeadingHeadingHeadingHeadingI
VIDEO	Provide captioning or transcript of audio. Videos should have player controls to pause, stop, and restart. <u>Captions, Transcripts, and Audio Descriptions</u>	Week 1 Video <u>Transcript link</u>
AUDIO	Provide downloadable transcript of audio files. Ensure audio player has controls to pause, stop and start clip. <u>Captions, Transcripts, and Audio Descriptions</u>	Week 2 Audio transcript link
